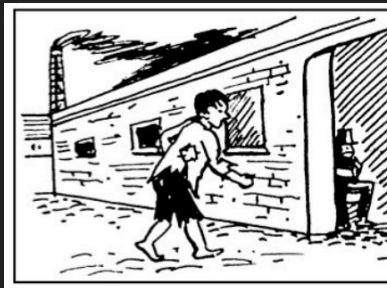

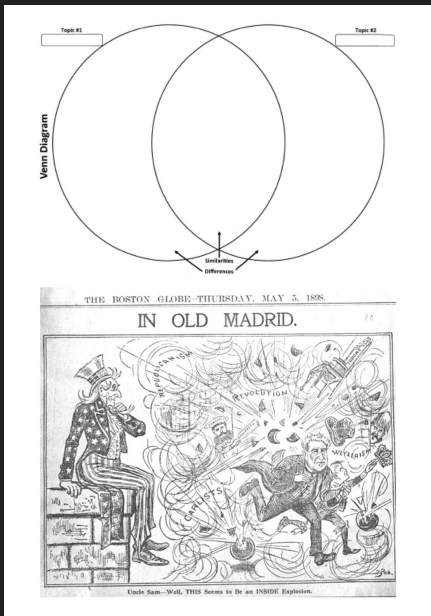

In mid February we left Monte Oscuro and were sent, together with all the P.O.U.M. troops in this sector, to make a part of the army besieging Huesca. It was a fifty-mile lorry journey across the wintry plain, where the clipped vines were not yet budding and the blades of the winter barley were just poking through the lumpy soil. Four kilometres from our new trenches Huesca glittered small and clear like a city of dolls' houses. Months earlier, when Sietamo was taken, the general commanding the Government troops had said gaily, "Tomorrow we'll have coffee in Huesca." It turned out that he was mistaken. There had been bloody attacks, but the town did not fall, and "Tomorrow we'll have coffee in Huesca" had become a standing joke throughout the army. If I ever go back to Spain I shall make a point of having a cup of coffee in Huesca.

At the end of August, a year after the invasion of Spain had begun, the same forces that carried out the attack against Brunete were transferred to a different front: Belchite, in the Aragon sector. There had been, for more than a year, the anarchist militias, undisciplined and uncontrollable. The military situation on the Aragon fronts was scandalous: most sectors had been inactive since the first months of the war with only slight isolated skirmishes that could scarcely be considered as military actions, and the morale of the militiamen, as a result of this situation, was very low. The new and disciplined brigades of the Popular Army arrived in Aragon and their victories were not only those of a military nature, penetrating enemy territory, but also the successes they obtained in our own territory, of great political significance.

As far as I was concerned the Battle of Teruel happened at the North Pole. It was bitter winter. My hands were sticking to metal and frostbite was a major factor in that battle. It was a cruel battle, the cold, the weather, the short days. By this time things were getting short in the war, such as food and clothing. In this battle I didn't have any shoes, just rope sandals. My feet were killing me and I was wrapping them in anything I could find.

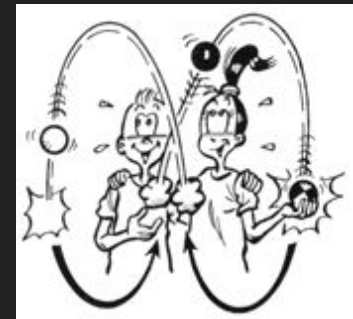

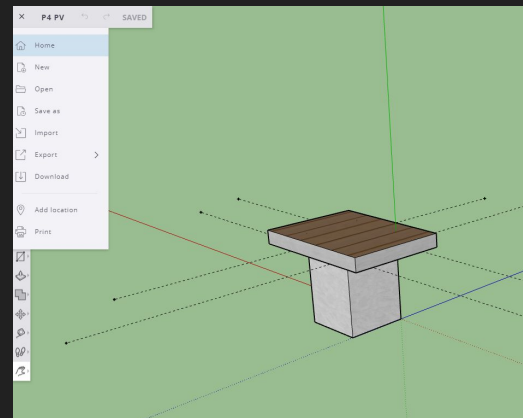
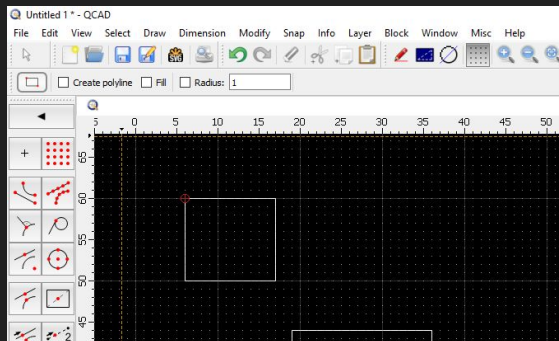

Big Antarctic ice sheet appears doomed

Warming climate predicted to trigger collapse of Filchner-Ronne shelf by 2100

A massive slab of floating ice that juts from Antarctica's west coast could be in hot water soon. Warm ocean currents threaten to sneak up from below and torpedo the ice in coming decades, researchers report in the May 10 *Nature*.

The degradation of the historically stable Filchner-Ronne Ice Shelf would upset ice on land, triggering runaway melting over a vast region of the continent and accelerating global sea level rise.

"The loss of this ice shelf would be catastrophic," says Ian Joughin, a glaciologist at the University of Washington. "We could be looking at tens of centimeters or even meters of sea level rise." The finding is in stark contrast to recent research suggesting that sea level rise due to the melting of Greenland's glaciers may fall short of worst-case scenarios (*SN Online*: 5/3/12).
